



We are grateful for the guidance and facilitation by the governmental authorities for the safe conduct of these indispensable rituals which offer a precious means of support for our congregations.



Special care is given to sustain those who risk being excluded from normal social life, especially the elderly, the chronically ill, persons with special needs and others. Several trained individuals help with outreach through authorized channels to distribute concrete aid of food and other basic necessities. I wish to thank all of them, especially those who in their professional activity are working at the forefront.

The theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote the following lines to his loved ones from prison a few months before his martyrdom under the Nazis which happened exactly 75 years ago:

By loving forces wonderfully sheltered, we are awaiting fearlessly what comes. God is with us at dusk and in the morning and most assuredly on every day.

These lines of hope illustrate that "loving forces" are never absent, even in the darkest moments of the human experience. We see them concretely before us in the form of so many who spread light, hope and peace amidst the suffering of the pandemic. May each one of us, in our own turn, be encouraged to act as responsible neighbors to the needy who are directly in front of us and do our part to bring relief, comfort and strength through our words and deeds.

As a result of the circumstances that we passed through and the state of emergency that was declared in the country due to the spread of the Corona virus, and In response to the call of His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, who said: "I invite you to show the positivity and spirit of optimism that we learned from our father Zayed in facing all challenges, and to create from the challenges opportunities for success.. Our fathers and grandfathers went through many crises and faced them with patience, hope and optimism. Today we have to follow them."

In the Emirates, many humanitarian and social charitable initiatives have been launched, including the launch of the Good Samaritan initiative "Alsamiri Alsaleh".

The idea arose out of the reality of emerging needs, the initiative focused on the people affected by the circumstances imposed by the epidemic and their families. Through coordination with His Excellency Bishop Gregory Khoury, Bishop of the Emirates, we have contacted families and people in need among the parish of Abu Dhabi on one hand and contacted those who are able to help on the other.



The initiative, which is still going on until now, was launched then, and initially included assistance in securing basic needs of food, household supplies, and medication on a monthly basis, and then it expanded to include medical aid in the form of treatments, free consultations, and service assistance, which varied between helping to provide job opportunities, helping to provide temporary housing, and others - all are provided by families, individuals, and volunteer doctors from the parishioners.

Parallel to the work to secure the material needs, work was underway to secure the social and psychological needs.

In addition to the personal lack of the parish priests, the meetings were launched through social media platforms with families and all age groups with the direct participation and supervision of the priests, the main motive for these meetings was the confirmation of hope and faith among the parish, helping them recognize positive aspects and the abundant blessings of God even in times of trouble, so that every individual is able to spread this positivity within the framework of his family and society. It dealt with the current situations from a spiritual point of view and provided solutions, in addition to explanations from the Bible.

In a beautiful gesture, the "children's choir", which was recently established, was continued remotely in order to support the children and keep them actively involved in the online social activities and to maintain social and ecclesiastical ties.

The love of good that God has instilled in all of our hearts is what motivates us to be a support for our brothers in humanity in these difficult days, knowing that the joy arising from giving and relieving the suffering of others is not matched by any other joy.

Peace in the middle of crisis

27 Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.

John 14\27

God did not promise us a life without problems. Rather, He had previously told us to expect tribulations and that we would face troubles and our faith would be tested. However, despite all this, we will have a wonderful peace.

The Church shares with the contemporary mankind his problems and anxieties, as it would like to contribute to confronting them, so that 'the peace of God that transcends all minds' dwells in the world (Philippians 4: 7). The church is always working to spread the good news of hope in the consciousness of its believers, the good news that can reshape the human reality from the inside, the good news of God word who declared that he is with us now (Emmanuel: God is with us), because God entered human reality to create a new thing.

This hope is not the case which is betting that the temporal or material future will be better, as the starting point of hope begins now. We hope for deliverance, but one



form of deliverance is that we must be certain of is the presence of God. We may suffer, but this does not mean losing hope in our survival, as the presence of God with us means that what is happening is linked to our survival plan. We have to realize that our survival is more than just freedom from disease, pain, distress, persecution or injustice. Our survival is the fulfillment of life meaning throughout all the events, which is achieved when we enjoy the presence of God who guarantees our safety and peace despite the distress.

This kind of hope is the greatest of all, because it is the only hope that does not disgrace 'Your faith and hope are in God' (Peter the First 1:21), we believe that he is capable of doing anything, and his is continuously working for us and saving us from every problem. he is the one who has saved us ..., and he is saving. he is the one in whom we have hope that he will also save afterwards' (2 Corinthians 1:10).

& the fruit of this hope is the enjoyment of the inner peace that God himself bestows, 'May the God of hope fill you with every happiness and peace in faith" (Romans 15:13).

If peace is God's bless to us, then what are the ingredients for possessing this bless?

The elements of the inner peace

Faith and Prayers

We cannot change the world around us, but we can change ourselves and live in heartfelt peace and peace with those around us and pray and work for peace.

Moreover, peace is a gift from God to the believer who has confidence in his promises and fears him in his life. For this peace, we pray and always ask God to grant us peace and we say: 'O Lord of Peace, give us your peace, decide for us your peace, and forgive our sins'. He gives us promises that we shall not be afraid, as he says: 'the mountains will go away, and the hills will shake, but my goodness does not go away. Your merciful God said. (Isaiah 54:10)

Repentance and a life of peace

Since God is the God of mercy, He calls us to repentance in order to enjoy living in

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peace. A wicked person does not enjoy peace, for this reason the Bible says: 'There is no peace, God said to the wicked" (Isaiah 48:22).

Jihad and grace

We must strive get the life of the inner peace, by moving away from anger, hatred, and desires that fight with the soul. We must also pray and seek God's grace on us while being humble and confident.

Love is the way to peace

Love makes us live in harmony and cohesion with God and people, for "God is love, and he who abides in love abides in God and God inside him" (John the first 4:16). The love of God as it enters the heart expels the pathological fear outside and makes us live in peace.


The role of the Church in society and being subject to the authorities

The Church is a part of the society and cannot be separated from it, as thus it is separated from the normal life. Therefore, the Church does not cease to pray for the ruler or the king, his counselors and men, so that God may give them peace and wisdom.

The Church - represented by its members, the community of the believers - lives in the society within all its dimensions, and it is appropriate for a believer Christian to translate his faith practically throughout his life, whether in his worship of God or in his relationship with all people, even his persecutors, presenting by the grace of God a living testimony of his Christ, the lover of mankind. His position as a living citizen feels his obligations towards his homeland in a humble and respectful spirit.

If the believer realizes that his heart has set out towards the heaven to find in it an eternal home, it shall increase his commitment to obedience and love to witness to the heavenly homeland through his practical behavior. In our obedience to the authority, we practice an evangelical commandment as an integral part of our spiritual life. This obedience is not through the mouth or the tongue, but rather with hard work, by fulfilling the nation's right to us, so we gladly fulfill our obligations, according to the words of the Bible: 'All the spirits are subject to the higher powers, because there is no authority except from God, Sultans are chosen by God ... fear to whom has fear, and honor to whom has honor." (Romans 13: 1, 7).




Charles Stanley once said, "We can be tired and weary and emotionally distraught, but after spending time alone with God, we find that he injects into our bodies energy, power and strength.

Confronting Corona with Comforting Care

At a time when the world is reeling with unprecedented turmoil, it is indeed a blessing to enjoy the benevolence of the rulers of the United Arab Emirates. Implementation of strategic initiatives in diverse communities has placed UAE in top tier for level of safety amid the pandemic. As a member of the Mar Thoma Church Abu Dhabi, I had the opportunity to watch the Vicars of our church confronting Covid-19 within government guidelines through spiritual discourses and activities that comforted the hearts and minds of the people. As I look back I remember....

Days and days of staying at home had slowly started taking a toll on me. The disease and death stories combined with the lockdown loneliness was hurting me. I began withdrawing into myself. I often felt afraid and fatigued. At one of my lowest points, a call from our Vicar lifted my spirit. It then dawned on me that perhaps I could do something to lift-up others from their loneliness and fears.

So I resolved to call at least four acquaintances every day. These were often quick "how are you" calls. Most people I called were hurting too. Just a friendly hello raised both of our spirits. As we shared stories of how good God has been to us during these Covid

days, hope and happiness filled our hearts. It energized me to volunteer in several parish activities.


Participating in our church's Covid-19 Helpline team taught me to calm down panicking Covid positive fellow parishioners and their families by providing them timely logistical guidance and emotional support. All they wanted was someone to hold them "virtually" close during their time in quarantine. Daily calls by our Vicars and follow up by the Helpline team gave them a sense of security and belonging. Assurance of 24x7 prayer strengthened their faith and hastened their recovery.

I watched with wonder the church's efforts to keep our children occupied during their summer break – virtual classes for Malayalam, music and life-skills engaged the children while giving some respite to parents. Helping to organise the life-skills sessions was immensely fulfilling. Bonding with the teens was therapeutic, especially as they shared their lockdown frustrations and hopelessness. Helping them face their fears through faith, helped me face my own fears too.

After months of staying at home we eagerly await re-opening of our church. Meanwhile we have adapted to online worship service, virtual choirs and zoom meetings. Medical guidance and counselling by experts, sharing testimonies of Covid survivors, honoring our Covid front liners, arranging chartered flights for needy members, providing spiritual solace to grieving families – rising to meet every need, our church leaders made us realize the importance of staying connected to religious organizations.

Even as we used sanitizers to wipe away the Corona virus, we learnt to use prayers to wipe away "Coronaphobia". Deploying our time and resources to bring peace and hope in the community is indeed the practice of Jesus' command to love our neighbors as ourselves

The Role of Religious Guidance in confronting the Epidemic

The Abu Dhabi Government and leadership, and the Department of Community Development were most valuable in helping us in going through those hard times successfully. They had great and useful initiative; they gave us tremendous support, and walked with us the whole way as full partners. We thank God for all of them, as we pray to God regularly for the blessing of our leaders and DCD.

The religious values have impacted our community greatly, as religious leaders shared those values with their denominations, using Holy Scripture and teachings from the Bible, with emphasis on loving God with all their hearts, and loving their neighbors as themselves.

This article is about sharing some of the practical ways of implementing those principles.

We found out that the initial and immediate needs were physical: financial help to help those who lost their jobs, or part of their income. Denominations joined together to raise funds and provide basic food supplies and distribute them to those in need, regardless of their ethnic or religious background.

More subtle needs were solving the issues of loneliness, inability to have friends visiting or sharing meals, dealing with problems stemming from the shut down; like the whole family learning to be in one place all the time, with loss of privacy and a comfort zone for parents and kids alike. Then there is the difficulty of getting used to the system of online learning.


We in our denominations, knowing the many educational, psychological and sociological implications took this very seriously, and had all our usual worship and religious teaching, CHANGE IN STYLE AND PRACTICE.

Here is what we did:

- Now that places of worship had to be closed down to protect every person and community, we started using social media tools like Facebook, Zoom, and the like. The amazing thing we found is that worshippers were keen to engage and were able to share their concerns and fears. The religious leaders were able to minister to those in need with counseling and prayer, using their abilities and training in a very personal and positive way.
- We had 3 major gatherings online weekly for adults, two meetings for children and teenagers. In those meetings there were group activities and video sharing to help with loneliness and personal sharing as encouraged under the religious leaders' quidance, with amazing results of more friendships and online visitations.
- We used the many skills the parishioners have, to serve the whole community: educating all in the areas of social distancing, hygiene, distance education, etc. with online seminars in all the above areas and more.
- A major service was in the area of health: there were lectures on holistic approaches to health: change in lifestyle, healthy eating, sleep habits, study habits, etc. This was helping us all to use the lock down time intelligently and productively.

We are confident that, with God's help and our determination, we will conquer this pandemic and help our community.

The Arab Evangelical Church in Abu Dhabi and facing the epidemic

The challenge of the Coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic constituted a clear call to religious institutions and places of worship around the world to move quickly and depart from its typical role and deal with the developments imposed by this epidemic from the health, psychological and economic repercussions on various segments of society, especially the weakest and most affected groups.

The Arab Evangelical Church in Abu Dhabi has been keen, since the first signs of this epidemic, to maintain full communication and coordination with the concerned government agencies to identify the necessary measures to combat the epidemic, and to fully adhere to these measures to achieve prevention for the masses of worshipers and society in general, especially the elderly, children, sick and other groups. The Church also endeavored to the extent possible, and despite the limitations imposed by the Coronavirus pandemic, to extend aid by prayer, advice, encouragement and practical assistance to those who were infected by the virus and who passed through the stages of quarantine, treatment and recovery, to those who were subjected to psychological and mental pressure, and to those who were stranded outside the country due to the abrupt pause and afflicted travel and aviation around the world,

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
which prevented them from returning to their families and their work inside the country, and also for those who dealt with material and economic repercussions on their work or employment status because of the virus.

In the period in which religious institutions throughout the country committed themselves to closing the places of worship to maintain social distancing, and in the absence of the possibility of actual meeting and communication between individuals, the Church has been employing social media not only to broadcast worship services and church education, but also to perpetuate communicating with the people of the Church, and praying for the end of the epidemic in our region and the world, and for God to grant wisdom and aid to everyone who contributes to planning and decision-making, as well as to the medical and security personnel and others working on the front lines to combat this epidemic in the country and around the world.

These meetings were also used to keep the people of the Church through social media to keep them up-to-date on the instructions issued by government agencies, to identify the difficulties and challenges facing any of them, to send messages of encouragement and reassurance to those who have been subjected to any form of suffering, and to provide guidance and education in specialized topics such as How to deal with anxiety and pressures, and to be keen on finding facts, extracting information from reliable sources, not contributing to the circulation of rumors, and maintaining family relationships in these difficult circumstances, and others. The Church also worked on maintaining communication through social media with younger age groups such as youth and children, through holding meetings, producing educational media materials, and conducting competitions and constructive games. Recently, the churches received with pleasure, welcome and gratitude to the Lord first, as well as to the decision-makers, the new instructions related to the opening of the space for worship meetings in church buildings within the preventive restrictions and precautionary controls that are still necessary.

This détente has had a good and encouraging effect on the souls of the worshipers because of the importance and value of collective worship and the communion of the believers in the hearts of all, asking the Almighty Lord to follow that further receding of the epidemic from the beloved land of the United Arab Emirates and more facilities in holding worship meetings, education and other church services.

After the National Emergency Crisis and Disaster Management Authority of UAE and In cooperation with the concerned authorities and Endowments temporarily suspended prayers in all places of worship across the nation from 16 March 2020, the Department of Community Development (DCD), has done a great job in continuously encouraging the Religious institutions in tackling the Global Pandemic COVID19, meeting the challenges ahead and on how best the religious institutions can support the Government by being active partners.

Along with an increased awareness of social distancing, wearing masks, hand gloves and use of hand sanitizers, the Religious leaders of the Nation also rose quickly taking effective steps in closing individual places of worship in response to the Pandemic.

The Christian leaders of UAE in particular joined hands together proclaiming solidarity with the UAE Government conveying the message that as people of faith, the church stands with the God of life the source of all existence. The Church pledged every effort to protect and safeguard health, raise the prospects of the sick, the vulnerable, the marginalized and the elderly.

It is said that the Role of Religious leaders was to address the challenge of the COVID19 pandemic from a medical, moral, and spiritual perspective, as the pandemic has interfered with three important aspects of Christian life: Congregation, Religious rites, and Pastoral care. All these aspects reveal how painful it can be if religious institutions are left out of pandemic plans, but the their involvement, majority of the institutions demonstrated the creativity and worked to adapt to the circumstances, finding ways to practice faith and serve their communities even under the prevailing restrictions. Some innovative and creative options that have inspired communities to accept and adapt to the new reality - traditional religious services have transitioned to online observance and meetings, reduced attendance at marriage ceremonies if any, virtual communion services and few baptisms.

Yet for some religious rituals and rites, the adaption was hard as COVID19 presented a hindrance to personal Pastoral care which is an important aspect of church, like house visits, caring for the sick, performing certain deaths and burial rites, giving spiritual support and guidance to the affected victims. The other issues that the Church has encountered other than the restrictions are financial problems, anxiety and depression amongst its members, which required the elders/ leaders take a highly personalized approach to ministry. Freed from many of the normal practices, the leaders are now poised to reach out to church members through personal calls or visits in an effort to hear their concerns and find meaningful ways to meet their needs and bring some relief to the afflicted souls.

The role of DCD is commendable in this case from the beginning.

BAPS Hindu Mandir's COVID 19 Relief Work in the UAE

The UAE is a leader in dealing with the COVID 19 pandemic in a comprehensive way. From well-planned sanitisation drives to adaptive healthcare facilities and easily available testing, the UAE is managing this crisis well.

Nonetheless, this disease by its innate nature has impacted thousands of people. It is in these times that community and spiritual organisations are needed most.

The Bochasanwasi Akshar Purushottam Swaminarayan Sanstha (BAPS) is an international social organisation recognised by the United Nations. Like its centres around the world, the BAPS Hindu Mandir in Abu Dhabi quickly activated to support the relief work required during this unprecedented crisis.

In support of the government's noble initiatives, the BAPS Hindu Mandir donated AED 11,000 to MA'AN's "Together We Are Good" initiative and sponsored 1500 meals as a part of the "10 Million Meals" campaign. In an effort to support medicos and patients, BAPS also organised volunteers to donate blood at the Abu Dhabi Blood Bank and as

well as donate 1,000 masks via the Indian Embassy in Abu Dhabi.

To diminish the social and economic impacts of the pandemic, many governments were supported by the UAE in their efforts to repatriate immigrant workers and tourists. To assist in these efforts, upwards of 15 volunteers a day contributed more than 5,000 manhours over two months at the Indian Consulate in Dubai. Along with logistical and operational support at the Consulate, the mandir was able to support more than 125 families by sponsoring tickets for the needy.

With community support, the mandir was able to provide groceries and supplies to individuals and families equal to more than 70,000 meals. 200 people were provided rent support while 300 people were provided accommodation outright.

Along with this relief work, the work of providing guidance and counselling was ongoing. With an eye towards avoiding large gatherings, the mandir immediately began weekly online prayers and assemblies in Hindi, English and Gujarati on its website.

On the occasion of the Global Day of Prayer, more than 10,000 people for 56 countries participated in online prayers performed in 6 Indian languages. The mandir's volunteer network reached out to more than 500 families every week to check on their wellbeing. The sadhus of the mandir were available for personal counselling and facilitated special support services for impacted families – from taking care the young children of affected parents to providing food according to religious norms to patients at home or at quarantine facilities.



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
